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From the Principal's Desk

Appreciating Language through Literature

As most know, one of the most important aspects of the study of English is reading. It is through reading that students expand their vocabulary, consolidate the knowledge of sentence patterns and structure, and their imagination is stimulated. The common rules of grammar become more familiar to the student and they can transfer this knowledge to their own writing and speaking. Moreover, it is often through reading that students - native speakers and learners of English as a second language alike - learn to appreciate the language.

The formal English curriculum includes many opportunities for students to improve their reading skills. There is a great emphasis on reading and interpreting news articles. These are extremely useful in teaching critical reading skills and are an excellent 'Real-life' source of English reading materials. A reading lesson has been set aside each week to focus solely on the development of reading skills and includes ample time for students to read a variety of texts of their own choosing.

The Lutheran Secondary School library actively promotes reading among students by running a regular reading scheme and periodically awarding prizes to students based on their borrowing habits.

Although Lutheran Secondary School has always had programmes in place to facilitate the promotion of reading among students, there are several new initiatives which will assist in this end.

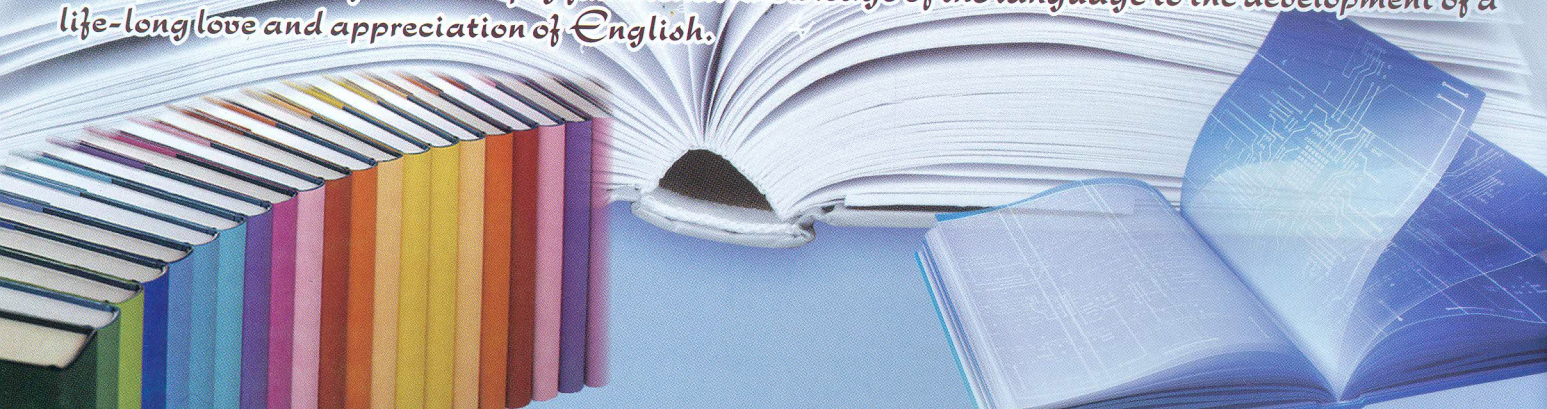
The school's English Corner - as part of the weekly lunchtime activity schedule - has set aside one day for quiet reading. Much work has been done to ensure that the English corner provides a comfortable and relaxing environment in which students can simply enjoy the pleasure of reading for enjoyment.

Our iPad learning scheme has been utilized by the English department in adding reading apps to the tablets. Through the use of such technology and the ease of access to reading materials that it creates, we hope to stimulate interest and motivation among student readers.

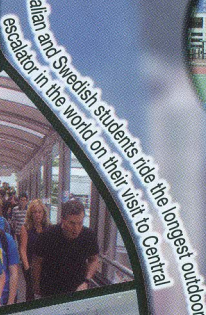
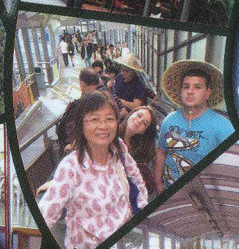

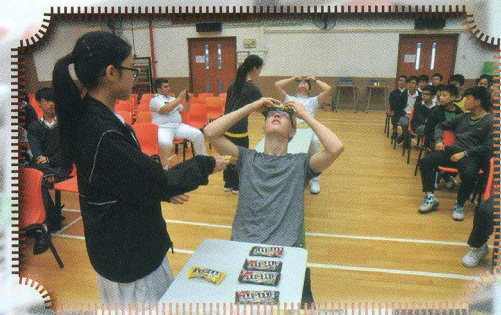


Visiting students from Singapore, Japan and Italy (Front to back) test their skills in "Bottle Bash", to the amusement of the student audience.

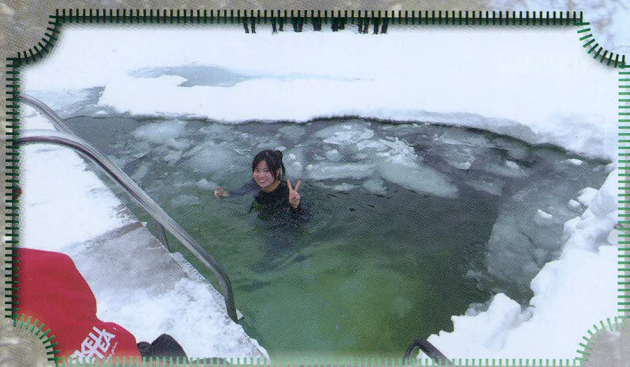

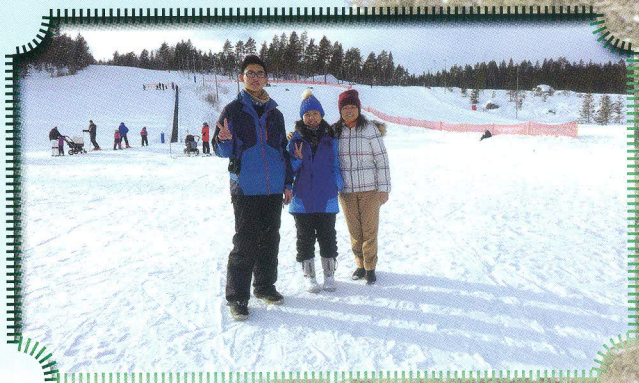
SWEDEN

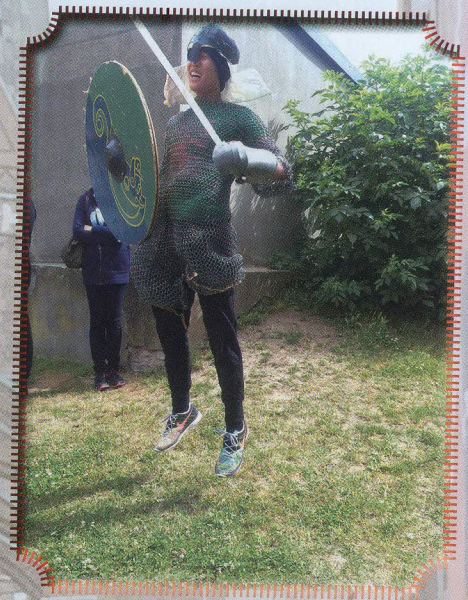

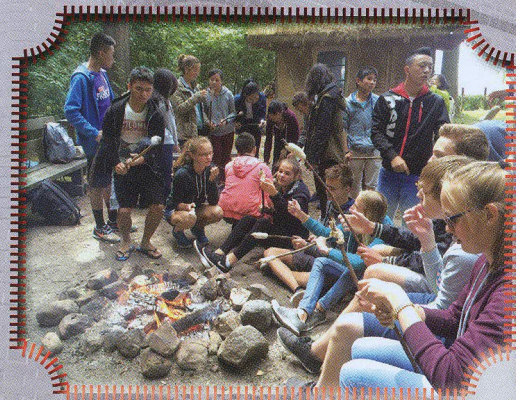
Building Self-Esteem and Communication Skills

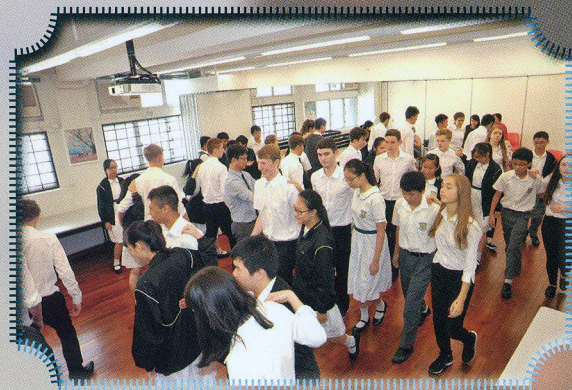
Scotland

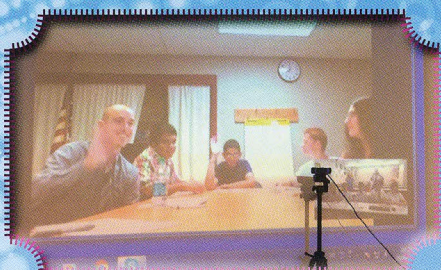

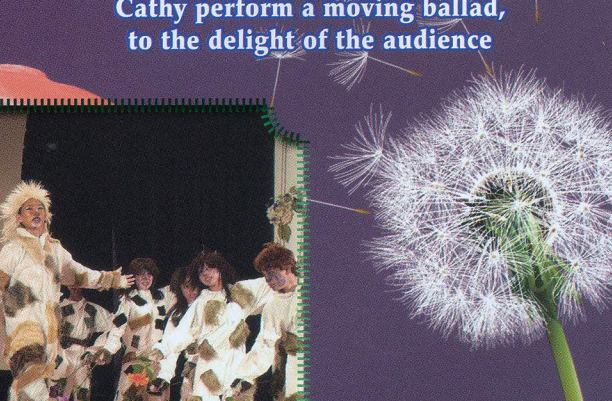
